

# Trash Collection Service Update

This fall, East Rockhill will seek bids to provide trash disposal services within the township's established Single-Hauler Trash District, which includes the Pines II, Pines III, and Cedarbrook Crossing developments.

While residents outside the trash district can choose their own private hauler, they are also eligible to take advantage of the discounted pricing that is included in the contract. To utilize the Single Hauler Trash Contract pricing and receive the same services for the same pricing, property owners should sign up for the entire contract period.

All private trash haulers in East Rockhill Township must provide trash, co-mingled recycling, and yard waste collection as part of the normal collection fee. They also must provide at least one collection each of leaves and garden materials, tree trimmings, and Christmas trees.

Details will be posted to the Township website when they become available.

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
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

# Driving Range Open Until Thanksgiving

The Driving Range at Markey Park will remain open through Wednesday, November 23, weather permitting. Until then, the range is open daily from dawn until dusk.

Tokens are available at the range from a dispenser for \$5 each. Tokens can also be purchased Monday through Friday between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the Township Office. You can buy them there for \$5 each or seven (7) for \$33. Senior citizens can purchase tokens for \$4.50 apiece. One token gives a bucket of 55 balls.

# Right of Way and Open Space Trees

The Township staff often hears from residents with safety concerns about trees throughout the township. Here are a few guidelines to remember:

- A dead tree in open space that will not damage any structures will be left to fall naturally as part of the natural life cycle. There is no need to report it.
- If you spot a dead street tree, contact township staff; the tree will be removed as time permits.
- If you spot a healthy street tree that has lifted the sidewalk more than two inches, please submit a request in writing with photos for removal, which will be reviewed by staff for approval by the Board of Supervisors. Within six months of approved sidewalk tree removal, the sidewalk must be repaired or replaced at the property owner's expense. An escrow is required to ensure the sidewalk is replaced.



# Keep Yard Waste and Personal Items Out Of Open Space

The township often receives complaints about yard waste, including grass clippings, being dumped in open spaces, detention basins, and waterways.

In addition to being illegal, such activity is harmful to the environment. Yard waste will be carried downstream during rainfall events to clog culverts and other facilities in the stormwater system. The resulting reduction in the capacity of the stormwater system could cause flooding for you and your neighbors.

In addition, yard waste, as it decomposes, will harm the quality of the stormwater within your watershed. We have a collection bin available year-round for the disposal of yard waste, and your private hauler is required to provide collections services.

However, grass clippings cannot be placed in the collection bin. We suggest composting grass clippings and using the compost to enrich and condition your soil. If composting is not possible, sweep up grass clippings before they enter a storm drain and put them out for regular trash collection.

Another issue, particularly in the Pines of Pennridge development, is residents whose property borders Township land, taking over open space with plantings, lawn furniture, and other items. Please be aware that personal property is not permitted in open space.

#### Holiday gift Ideas: Give Items that Replace Disposables and Encourage Reuse

Use the time of gift-giving to encourage the use of reusable items instead of their disposable, single-use counterparts. Invest in durable items that will last a long time. Some examples are:

- Reusable straws (with scrub brush): they come in stainless steel, silicon, glass, or bamboo
- Rechargeable batteries with a charger. Solar options are available, too.
- Swedish dishcloths: get several for different household uses. Also makes a great house gift.
- Set of cloth napkins: for meals at home or to take along with lunch.
- Bamboo utensil set: comes in a holder that clips to a backpack. Great for the student in your life!
- Reusable shopping bags: many stores and organizations sell them
- Set of cloth reusable gift bags: make them yourself out of fun fabric scraps
- Waxed cotton food wraps: they come in lots of fun designs.

#### Improve indoor air quality by avoiding scented candles made with paraffin

Winter is a great time to light a scented candle and get cozy. But if your candles are made of paraffin, you'll be getting a lot of nasty byproducts with that pleasant aroma. Paraffin wax is a petroleum derivative; candles made from it waft highly toxic benzene and toluene into the air when burned.

The wicks of many scented candles contain heavy metals such as lead and emit them when lit—as much as five times the amount of lead considered dangerous for children. The artificial perfumes and dyes used in many candles are also hazardous and the petro-soot from paraffin candles is the same soot found in exhaust from diesel engines.

A far better alternative is beeswax. Beeswax candles release negative ions when burned, which helps clean the air by binding with positively charged pollen, dust, dirt, and other pollutants, weighing them down and causing them to drop from suspension.

Soy candles are another option but most soy candle companies use a blend of soy and paraffin and legally label their candles "soy." Look for 100% soy candles. Also look for non-GMO soy candles.

Air pollution is the world's single largest environmental health risk. We tend to think of it as an outdoor problem but indoor air pollution is a serious threat to your health because the air indoors is typically worse and because we spend as much as 90% of our time inside.

# Please follow these guidelines to ensure a successful collection:

- Have your leaves in neat piles along road frontage by 7 a.m.
  on the first day of collection for your section. Once leaves
  have been picked up on your street, do not place leaves out
  for a second collection; we won't return to a street once the
  leaves have been collected.
- Do not include rocks, sticks, trash, grass, or other material with your leaves. This does damage to the collection machine, causing downtime and expenses for repairs.
- Township employees and/or equipment are not permitted to enter private property to remove leaves; only leaves on road frontage can be removed.
- The collection of leaves is weather-dependent; updates to the schedule will be posted on the Township website.

If you have additional leaves after your section pick-up has been completed, do not place along street frontage impeding stormwater flow. Contact your private trash hauler for collection or dispose of it in the yard waste containers behind the Township office Monday through Saturday from 6 a.m. to 9.p.m. and on Sunday from 6.a.m. to 1.p.m. No bags are allowed and the site is electronically monitored.

# No Open Burning Allowed in the Township



The Township's Code Enforcement Department and Pennridge Regional Police would like to remind residents that the burning of trash and recyclable materials -- including leaves and tree waste -- is prohibited by Township Ordinance in compliance with the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection regulations.



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# FROM THE DESK OF Kathleen Percetti, Tax Collector

All 2022 real estate taxes have been mailed. Please contact me if you have not received your bills and I will be happy to email you or send you a copy in the mail.

Bucks County and East Rockhill Township real estate taxes were mailed on March 1 and are now due in penalty until the end of this year. Pennridge School District real estate taxes were mailed on July 1 and are due in face until October 31. After October 31, the school taxes will be due in penalty until the end of the year. Final notices will be mailed out by November 15.

If you elected to pay your school real estate tax by installment, the remaining two installment coupons were mailed in mid-September. The second installment is due on October 31 and the final installment is due December 15. Please note that if you elect to opt in to pay by installments, you cannot opt out after the first payment is made.

The Pennsylvania Property Tax/Rent Rebate program benefits eligible Pennsylvanians age 65 and older; widows and widowers age 50 and older; and people with disabilities age 18 and older.

The Property Tax/Rent Rebate is based on the property taxes or rents you paid during the previous calendar year. Property owner's eligible income including the income that your spouse earned while residing with you is \$35,000 or less. For renters, that threshold is \$15,000 or less. Applicants can exclude one half of their Social Security income. The rebates range from \$250-\$600 based on your income levels. More information can be found at www.revenue.pa.gov.

The Pennridge School District Board of Directors approved a property tax rebate program in September of 2019 that will see a discount of up to \$162.50 for certain homeowners. You can find the application and the instructions on the Pennridge School District website or you can call the Pennridge business office at 215-453-2713.

## Safely Dispose of Old Medications

The Pennridge Regional Police Department takes part in a "drug take-back" program coordinated by the Bucks County District Attorney's Office, the County Detectives, and the DEA.

The Department purchased a Med Return dropbox, which is located in the waiting room of the PRPD building at 200 Ridge Road. Citizens can drop unwanted medication into the box anonymously with no questions asked. The box is routinely emptied and medications promptly turned over to the District Attorney's office for proper disposal.



# Driveway Maintenance is Your Responsibility

Property owners are responsible for keeping their driveway pipes clear of debris so stormwater can flow in the right-of-way. Maintaining the driveway so that stone does not go onto the public road, causing traffic safety issues, is also required.

By the way, our Public Works Department replaces up to four driveway pipes each year. The driveway must be located on a Township-owned road; cost is materials, plus an installation fee according to the current fee schedule.

If you are interested in using this service, please send us an email requesting the installation. An agreement will be mailed to you with notification of the material cost, and an invoice sent after the work is completed.

If you choose to hire a contractor to install a driveway pipe, a Road Occupancy permit is required.

# Is Your Address Visible in an Emergency?

Imagine a member of your family starts having a heart attack and you call 911, You rightfully expect first-responders to get to you as soon as humanly possible.

But if your address number doesn't stand out well on your mailbox or door, a first-responder might drive right by. You wouldn't want them to pass by your home in the middle of an emergency when seconds are precious to a positive outcome.

Police, fire, and emergency medical personnel encourage all property owners to take a few minutes to ensure their addresses are

clearly visible from the road, especially at night and in bad weather.

The key, according to experts, is to make sure house numbers are large enough, are on a contrasting background, and do not blend in too well with their surroundings. First-responders must be able to

quickly and easily make out the number from a distance, they say.

Generally, address numbers should be at least four inches in height and for the numbers and letters to be on a contrasting color background.



# Be Prepared for Severe Weather

As everyone surely remembers, our area was hit in late August with torrential rain from the remnants of Hurricane Ida, causing severe flooding. Despite the best efforts of everyone involved, the local infrastructure is simply not capable of keeping up with multiple inches of rainfall over a short period of time.

The best thing you, as a property owner, can do is be prepared for the possibility of flooding. By taking the following steps, you can help keep your household and property out of danger.

#### **Before the Event**

Inspect your home. Remove leaves and debris from gutters, clear your storm drains and drainage areas of any debris or trash, make sure windows and doors are properly secured, and make sure your sump pump is working if you have one.

During the winter, remove ice and snow from areas near drains and downspouts. If there is snow around your home's foundation, clear it before it melts. Moving snow just three to five feet away from the house may reduce the risk of water damage.

#### **During the Event**

If there is water in your home and a sump pump is ineffective, ensure that water stays away from outlets and other electrical sources. Carefully turn off your main electrical switch while standing on a dry, non-conductive surface such as heavy rubber, plastic, or dry wood.

Also, be on alert for gas leaks, If the water rises high enough to extinguish the pilot light on your water heater or furnace, it may be letting gas into the property. Turn off the gas supply to these units, if possible. Do not use candles, lanterns, or open flames in the area, and do not smoke until you are absolutely certain that leaking is not an issue.

If water starts to rise in your house before you have escaped, retreat to a higher floor. Do not try to swim to safety. Instead, wait for rescuers to come to you.

#### **After the Event**

Wait for the water to drain out of the property, then check for structural damage before re-entering the property. Do not use matches, lighters, or any other open flame, since explosive gas may still be trapped inside. Keep the power off until an electrician has inspected your system.

If the damage is severe, consider a professional cleaning service. If you choose to clean the property yourself, make sure to wear appropriate protection such as rubber boots and gloves. Disinfect any affected areas with a solution of water and bleach (four tablespoons of bleach per gallon of water).

# **Snow Emergency Route**

With winter coming, now is a good time to remind you that the Township's Snow Emergency Route is Buck Drive, Bryant Drive, Campus Drive, Deer Run Road, Fifth Street (Perkasie Borough line to Schwenkmill Road), Greenleaf Circle, Pine Court and Sunnyside Lane.

During a snow emergency, cars cannot be parked on the street along the Snow Emergency Route to allow for efficient snow removal.

Snow emergency situations are announced on Twitter and via real-time email notification when posted to our homepage.






# **Attention Rental Property Owners**

# Swimming Pool Discharge Information:

To help protect stream health and aquatic life, the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is offering some helpful tips and (not so) gentle reminders on how to properly close swimming pools for the year. Whether you're a private owner, manage a public pool, or work for a pool maintenance company, these reminders are for you.

Discharged pool water and waters containing chlorine or other chemicals can be detrimental to aquatic life if not handled responsibly. It is extremely important that these waters are handled correctly. Pool water must not be discharged to any storm sewer or land in which a storm sewer is accessible because runoff can cause fish kills and unsafe aquatic conditions.

When draining a swimming pool this year, make sure to protect Pennsylvania by following these tips:

- Pool water may be disposed of through the sanitary sewer system ONLY with municipal permission.
- Never dispose of pool water through a storm sewer, which will discharge to a stream.
- If lowering the water level of the pool, let it drain to a lawn to prevent it from running off into a storm sewer.



• If a sanitary sewer system is not available, water may be used for irrigation if it does not run off the property or into a storm sewer.

And don't forget: The discharge of swimming pool water to any waters of the commonwealth without a permit is a violation of the Clean Streams Law. Property owners and pool companies that violate this law may be prosecuted and penalized for damages. Don't let this happen to you!

# Development Updates


#### Three Mile Run Road

As we go to press, the East Rockhill Township Planning Commission has held two meetings to review and make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors, which is holding conditional use hearings as posted to the township website.

The proposed development calls for 46 townhouses at 809-901 Three Mile Run Road, a permitted use in the S-Suburban Zoning District by Conditional Use, which adds a layer of approval to the review process. After the Conditional Use hearing, the plan will be submitted as a subdivision plan and go through a normal review process.

#### McClennen Tract

Final approval by the Board of Supervisors is pending. Construction is anticipated to begin soon after. Select Properties is planning to build 198 homes, about half of which will be single- family homes and half townhouses, on 66.17 acres between Old Bethlehem Pike and Hill Road north of Three Mile Run.



#### **Roundabout Coming**

With a goal to slow traffic and improve safety, a roundabout is being planned for Park Avenue (Old Bethlehem Pike) and Three Mile Run Road. We will announce more details as they become available.

#### **Land Preservation**

The Board of Supervisors has authorized purchase of a conservation easement totaling 22 acres at 1800 Three Mile Run Road using the Earned Income 0.25% tax as approved by voter referendum. To date, 3,090 acres (or 37% of East Rockhill Township) have been protected from development.



As part of our efforts to provide valuable services to residents, the municipal code is now searchable.

DEP wants to help Pennsylvania communities complete all necessary stream work in a way that is environmentally-responsible, reduces the likelihood of future flooding problems, and complies with regulations. When in doubt, contact PA DEP for assistance before you start stream work projects.





# Green Light—Go!

Proceed—These actions do <u>not</u> require DEP notification, pre-approval, or additional permits:

- Removing woody debris and manmade debris materials from the stream, banks, and riparian areas by hand or using handheld equipment
- Removing above items using heavy equipment from the bank; equipment should not enter the stream or dig into the streambed
- Removing gravel and debris in and close to bridges and culverts (Note: review permit conditions first)
- Crossing a flooded stream for emergency access to your property, if conditions are safe



# Yellow Light—Slow Down!

Call DEP first—Notification, pre-approval, or emergency permits may be required:

- Rebuilding roads and bridges across streams
- Streambank stabilization projects, including riprap
- Removing gravel bars from the stream channel using heavy equipment
- Repairing a bridge or culvert, or removing one in danger of failure



# Red Light—Stop!

These actions require permits from DEP, and possibly from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers or other agencies:

- Redirecting the flow of a stream by reshaping gravel bars, or moving gravel to the streambank
- Moving/relocating a stream
- Dredging or damming streams, or creating dikes
- Building a new bridge or culvert

**WHEN:** November 8, 2022 is the general election

East Rockhill Township is divided into two districts, but there is only one polling place:

Bucks County Community College One Hillendale Road Perkasie, PA Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

To determine what voting district you are in, check the Voting District Map on the township website (eastrockhilltownship.org).

New voters must show identification the first time they vote in a new district.

Voters who are ill or will be away from their designated voting districts on Election Day can download an Absentee ballot from the Bucks County website or pick up a form at the Post Office, Township Building, Wine & Spirit Shoppe, or library.

All Pennsylvanians are now eligible for mail-in ballots. You may request this ballot without reason. If you applied for a mail-in ballot with "permanent status" before the Primary Election, you will receive one for the General Election. If you did not, you will need to re-apply for a mail-in ballot.

The last day to apply for a mail-in or absentee ballot is Tuesday, November 1 (subject to change). Apply online at www.VotesPA.com or call the Board of Elections.

**Concerns on Election Day:** If you have concerns on Election Day, call the Election Protection Hotline at 866-OUR-VOTE (866-687-8683). Official answers from the PA Department of State on Election Day are available on Election Day at 1-877-868-3772 from the Pennsylvania Department of State; interpreters are available.

# From the West Rockhill Historical Society

## Badge Honoring Pennridge Regional Police 30th Anniversary presented to the Historical Society

Police officers began patrolling East and West Rockhill Townships as the Pennridge Regional Police Department (PRPD) on January 1, 1992. The department was born out of a need to provide police services to East Rockhill, West Rockhill, and Sellersville Borough, after the retirement of the chiefs from each department.

The three municipalities formed a Police Commission and hired William Heim as their first Police Chief. The first police station was in the Sellersville Borough building at 140 E. Church Street from January 1992 to December 2002.

Since 1992, many changes have occurred at the department, including the departure of Sellersville Borough and construction of a new state-of-the-art police station at 200 Ridge Road in 2011. An interim police station served the townships of East and West Rockhill from January 2003 until October 2011. It was located in a renovated farmhouse located at 1027 Ridge Road. This building is now the Headquarters of the West Rockhill Historical Society and known as the Heritage House, serving as a museum and research center since 2019.

The development of an intern program and many community-oriented outreach programs have helped the department provide the highest level of police services to those living and visiting the Pennridge Area. In recognition of the 30th anniversary of the department, the Pennridge Regional Police Commission approved the purchase of 30th Anniversary badges to be worn by the officers during the year of 2022.

The badges are worn in place of the issued Pennridge Regional Police badge and were purchased from a combination of donations and department funds. As documenting history is important to the community, members of the Pennridge Regional Police Department have donated the 30th Anniversary Police Badge for display by the West Rockhill Historical Society. The badge, along with the history of the Regional Police Department, will be on display at the Heritage House.


