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

Paul Miller's Law: Pennsylvania's New Distracted Driving Legislature

Pennsylvania has enacted a new distracted driver law named in memory of Paul J. Miller Jr., a 21 year old male from Scranton who was killed in a head on traffic accident involving a distracted tractor trailer driver. The law took effective on June 5, 2025, which prohibits a driver from holding or using any "interactive mobile device." An interactive mobile device includes phones, smartphones, PDAs, portable computers. These restrictions even apply to vehicles that are stopped at a red light or are in stop and go traffic. Simply put, drivers are no longer permitted to hold or manipulate a cellphone when sitting behind the steering wheel.



The law does not limit the use of hands free use of the cell phone to make phone calls, GPS navigation and any other use that does not include holding the devices are permitted under the new law. Additionally, a driver can use a handheld cellphone to contact emergency services, such as police or other emergency responders.

Police can only issue warnings for violations of the law until June 5, 2026. After June 5, 2026 violators of the Paul Miller Law will receive a \$50 fine and associated court costs when issued a traffic citation.



Internet Safety Tips

The Pennridge Regional Police Department has been receiving an increase in residents becoming victims of internet based crimes. We have seen consistent victimization of juveniles and teens as they navigate social media and other websites. Below are a few tips for your teens and you to consider when using the internet and social media:

- **Protect Your Personal Info:** Never share your full name, address, phone number, passwords or locations publicly, this includes turning off your location sharing on applications unless absolutely necessary.
- **Use Strong Passwords:** Make sure you are using unique passwords for each account and these passwords should include a combination of letter, numbers and symbols that do not include you name or birthdays. NEVER,

NEVER share your passwords.

- Be Smart on Social Media: Ensure that all profiles are set to private and make sure you only follow people who you know and also regularly review your friends and followers. Never post anything that you wouldn't want your parent, teacher, or employer to see. Remember once something is posted on a social media app or the internet is viewable to almost anyone forever.
- Recognize & Report Cyberbullying: If someone is harassing you or threatening you online, STOP COMMUNICATING with them and make sure to block that person and report them to the platform you are using to talk to them. Also remember to speak with a trusted person or law enforcement if the bullying gets serious or affects your mental health.
- Avoid Scams & Phishing: Don't post on suspicious links, especially in emails or messages from unknown senders! Remember if it sounds to good to be true it probably is!
- Think Before You Send: Don't talk to strangers online, especially those who ask personal questions and if that person makes you uncomfortable please stop communicating and tell a family member, teacher, counselor or law enforcement.
- **Keep Devices Secure:** Make sure your devices antivirus software and applications are up to date to prevent issues with hacking. Never download apps or games form an untrusted site.
- Balance Screen Time: Consider the use of screen time tools to set limits and set breaks in use of the device. Too much time online will affect your sleep, mood, and performance at work and school.
- Tips for Parents: Remember to keep open communication with your children and ask questions about who your child is talking to or games they are playing. Stick to your rules about online use, such as setting limits on screen time, content and who and when they can communicate with others. Encourage digital responsibility rather than relying on restrictions, but consider the use of parental controls and monitoring tools.

Dan McPhillips, Bucks County Recorder of Deeds, offers a Fraud Alert program that is designed to protect Bucks County property owners' deeds. It is easy to sign up, and a FREE service to all Bucks County residents and business owners.

As the Recorder of Deeds, Dan McPhillips knows the purchase of your property is most likely the largest and most important purchase of a lifetime. To protect your investment, we encourage you to enroll in the Fraud Alert program. Once enrolled, the property owner will be alerted anytime a document has been recorded in the office against your name or parcel number. A cell phone or email address is needed to sign up for this program. We suggest you sign up by both name and parcel number for assurance. Should you receive an alert (text message or email), follow the instructions and contact our office immediately. If fraudulent activity occurs, our office will connect you with the District Attorney's office. We cannot emphasize enough the importance that you follow-up on any alert, never assume it was received in error. The staff is available to help and dedicated to keeping your investment safe.

Tax Rebate for Volunteer Fire and Non-Profit Emergency Medical

With the adoption of Ordinance 307 on March 25, 2025, a tax rebate was enacted to help address the shortage of volunteer emergency medical and firefighting services to East Rockhill residents.

After meeting certain criteria, a tax rebate on qualified real estate taxes paid to the Township will be based on the number of points the Volunteer earned.

Emergency Responders:

- 100 points: 25% tax rebate with \$250 maximum
- 200 points: 50% tax rebate with \$500 maximum
- 400 points: 75% tax rebate with \$750 maximum
- 600 points: 100% tax rebate with \$1,000 maximum

Administrative Member:

• 50 points: 10% tax rebate with \$100 maximum

Cold Weather Fire Safety

Heating, cooking, decorations and candles all contribute to an increased risk of fire in your home during the holiday season and winter months. It's not too early to prepare. The following 10 tips provided by the National Fire Protection Association will help you be better prepared.

- Our furnace has been inspected and serviced by a qualified professional during the last 12 months. (A furnace should be serviced at least once a year.)
- Our chimneys and vents have been cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional. I have checked for creosote built-up. (Not cleaning your chimney is the leading cause of chimney fires from built up creosote. This service needs to be done at least once a year.)
- Our wood for our fireplace or wood stove is dry, seasoned wood.
- Our fireplace screen is metal or heat-tempered glass, in good condition and secure in its position in front of the fireplace.
- We have a covered metal container ready to use to dispose cooled ashes. (The ash container should be kept at least 10 feet from the home and any nearby buildings.)
- Our children know to stay at least 3 feet away from the fireplace, wood/pellet stove, oil stove or other space heaters.
- Our portable space heaters have an automatic shut-off.
- Our portable space heaters will be plugged directly into an outlet(not an extension cord) and placed at least three feet from anything that can burn; like bedding, paper, walls, and even people. (Place notes throughout your home to remind you to turn off portable heaters when you leave a room or go to bed.)
- We have tested our smoke alarms and made sure they are working. (You need smoke alarms on every level of the home, inside each sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. For the best protection, the smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.)
- We have tested our carbon monoxide alarms and made sure they are working. (Carbon monoxide alarms should be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.)

Downspouts & Sump Pump Compliance

Stormwater is improperly entering our sanitary sewer system due to connected downspouts and sump pumps. This is prohibited in Code of Ordinance \$26-340 and imposes fines of up to \$1,000.00 per day for violations. Ensure your sump pump and downspouts drain into the storm sewer or onto your lawn to avoid penalties. Stormwater is prohibited onto a sidewalk to prevent icing.







A message from Public Works

Our goal at the Public Works Department during the winter season is to make all Township-owned roads safe and accessible to the public. The cooperation and assistance of our residents is key to an effective winter storm operation. Due to many variables that are inherent in Pennsylvania weather, each storm and/or weather event, may require slightly different efforts and/or emphasis on any number of maintenance tasks, which together, determine the overall winter maintenance, snow removal, or ice control strategy.

- Shoveling snow to the right-hand side of your driveway will reduce the amount of snow pushed back into your driveway by a plow. It is recommended, if possible, that homeowners shovel after the Township has plowed their road.
- Mailboxes are rarely hit by plows, but may be damaged by the weight of the plowed snow. We ask that homeowners ensure that their mailboxes are firmly attached to the post and that the post is sturdy enough to withstand the weight of the plowed snow. Residents should also be sure that the mailbox area is clear for mail delivery.
- If you believe that your street was missed during a snow clearing effort, call 215-257-9156.

Snow Emergency Route

With winter coming, now is a good time to remind you that the Township's Snow Emergency Route is Buck Drive, Bryant Drive, Campus Drive, Deer Run Road, Fifth Street (Perkasie Borough line to Schwenkmill Road), Greenleaf Circle, Pine Court and Sunnyside Lane.

During a snow emergency, cars cannot be parked on the street along the Snow Emergency Route to allow for efficient snow removal.

Snow emergency situations are announced on Twitter and via real-time email notification when posted to our homepage.

Yes If the tree trunk is located in the Township owned right-of-way and not on power lines. If the tree is on the homeowner's property, the Township will remove the tree from the road and the homeowner is responsible for removing the tree from their property.

How do I report a Street Light that is not working, or a Street Sign that is damaged?

Call 215-257-9156 with the exact location of the Street Light and the Pole # if applicable (this can be found on the Pole tag). For damaged Traffic signs call 215-257-9156 with the exact location of the sign. Report a concern can also be utilized available under Resources on our website.


2025 Fall Leaf Collection

East Rockhill Township began its leaf collection program because of the need to keep stormwater inlets clear. The leaves collected are taken to facilities that recycle them into compost. If you have a composting lawn mower, consider using it to leave the composting leaves in place to benefit your lawn instead of piling them up at the road for collection.

Leaf collection is weather- and time-dependent, among other factors. We do our best to stay on schedule, but unfortunately there are times we get behind. **An updated schedule is available on our homepage.** Leaves must be placed by 7am on the first day of collection for your section.

Because of the large amount of collection that needs to take place, we are limited to a one-time collection of each street. Once the machine has collected your street, it will not return.

Pile leaves as close to the roadway as possible. The machine cannot reach farther than the shoulder, so leaves beyond that point will not be collected.

Mow leftover leaves into your lawn to provide a natural source of nutrients, reduce weeds and insects, and require less water.

As leaves pile up in your yard, consider recycling them back into your lawn. Michigan State University Extension turf specialists have determined that simply going over the fallen leaves with your mower or a specialized mulching mower is a smart gardening practice that saves you money and reduces weeds. Why sweep them to the curb when you make a few trips over them with your mower and at the same time, add a natural source of nutrients to your lawn that will make it healthier?

Smart gardening practices are more sustainable: you can continue using this practice as long as you have trees and the leaves continue to fall. You will not need to apply as much fertilizer, organic or inorganic, as the leaves will provide additional nutrients to the soil once they decompose.



You can use your mower or a specialized mulching mower to grind up the leaves into smaller pieces. Be sure you go over the leaves a number of times, making sure they are broken down into small pieces. This way the leaves will not mat together, but will settle down into the turf and be decomposed by valuable microorganisms within the soil.

A healthier lawn is more resilient to weeds, insects and diseases, and requires less water inputs. If you have many trees and just too many leaves fall for you to mow, collect the mulched leaves every other mowing and put them over your cleaned out vegetable beds. Apply a 3-to-6-inch layer of mulched leaves on the vegetable garden soil. This mulch will reduce the chance of topsoil erosion and will add valuable organic material that microorganisms will continue to use throughout this fall, winter and spring as shelter and food. Next spring, you can lightly turn this mulch into the soil or plant directly into it or beneath it, depending upon whether you are seeding or transplanting. Continue this practice yearly, and you will be adding valuable organic material that improves your soil's structure and thus, its ability to hold water and air.

You can also mulch landscape beds layering 3 to 6 inches over your plantings.

Decline Printed Receipts

Most receipts today are made of thermal paper that contains free-form bisphenol-A (BPA) or bisphenol-S (BPS) instead of ink to produce the letters and numbers on receipts. These chemicals can transfer to your skin or food in your shopping bag. BPA and BPS have been linked to endocrine disruption which can adversely affect your reproductive health, brain development, and heart and lung health, among other organs and bodily functions.

Disinfect with Non-Toxic Cleaners

Disinfectants commonly use strong ingredients like quaternary ammonium chloride, peroxide, or bleach-based substances, which could have unintended side effects. Try hydrogen peroxide or oxygen bleach instead.

Driving Range Schedule

The Driving Range at Markey Park will remain open through Tuesday, November 25, weather permitting. Until then, the range is open daily from dawn until dusk.

The Environmental Cost of Lawns

Despite looking lush and green, traditional turf grass lawns provide little to no environmental benefits. In fact, they often have detrimental effects on the quality of local waterways, wildlife habitat, and the air that we breathe. Here are some of the ways that lawns can harm the environment:

- Lack of Biodiversity lawns are typically made up of a single, nonnative grass species that does not provide shelter or food for wildlife.
- Increased Water Usage lawns consume more water than native landscapes leading to water waste and increased runoff.
- Increased Carbon Footprint the maintenance of lawns requires the use of gas powered lawn equipment that contributes to air pollution and greenhouse gas emissions.
- Use of Harmful Pesticides / Fertilizer these chemicals can harm local wildlife, contaminate water resources, and lead to the growth of algae that can be harmful to humans and pets.

- Decrease your lawn area smothering grass with cardboard is an easy way to kill turf and add garden area to your yard. Late summer / fall is the perfect time to remove turf and add native plants!
- Reduce / eliminate your household pesticide / herbicide use use environmentally friendly alternatives or eliminate lawn care products all together!
- Plant with a variety of native species native plants are vital to the survival of pollinators, birds and other wildlife. When planting your garden, aim to use species that bloom throughout the year as well as a mix of perennials, shrubs and trees!
- Add a bird, bat or pollinator house providing safe areas for wildlife to rest and raise their young is a great way to increase the diversity of wildlife that call your yard home!





Sewer & Street Light Customers Helpful Information

East Rockhill Township provides public sewer by being a member of the Pennridge Wastewater Treatment Authority and by a system owned and maintained by East Rockhill Township which includes a treatment plant, pump station and sewer lines.

Bills are sent four times a year in January, April, July and October for the prior quarter as a fixed dollar amount based on residential or non-residential use, number of equivalent dwelling units (EDUs) and current fee schedule.

PP&L owns all street lights in the Township and charges the Township for maintenance and electricity. Properties located in the street light district receive an annual assessment which is invoiced in March.

All sewer and street light billing inquires, payments, and related information are handled by East Rockhill.

Payments can be made through the Citizen Action Center Portal, at the drive-up payment box located in front of the Township Municipal Office or in-person at the Township Municipal Office during business hours.

PREVENTING STORMWATER POLLUTION

Winter is here, and with colder temps comes snow and ice that we need to remove from our sidewalks and driveways. To make this chore easier, many of us use deicers, like salt, at our homes. However, these chemical deicers often have harmful impacts on aquatic life and the water quality of local streams and creeks. Here are some tips to reduce salt use and prevent pollution this winter:

- Reduce your salt use! More salt does not mean less ice. Use deicing products sparingly and follow the label instructions. Sweep up any remaining salt before it is washed away.
- Shovel first. Shoveling early will prevent ice from forming, reducing the amount of salt you will need to use.
- Plant natives that are salt tolerant! This spring, plant salt tolerant, native perennials where stormwater runoff from your driveway or sidewalks accumulates. Butterfly milkweed is a great example of a salt tolerant PA native plant!

SUPPORTING WILDLIFE THROUGH THE WINTER MONTHS

Colder temps and shorter days can make a lot of wildlife less active and harder for us to spot. However, many of our local critters will appreciate a helping hand during the chilly months. Here are some ways to help wildlife this winter:

- Leave seedheads standing. Seeds provide food for birds and small mammals and hollow stems are valuable shelter for insects. Wait until early spring to cut back seedheads and perennial tops.
- Provide a water source. During freezing temps, make sure to thaw bird baths and other water sources for wildlife to utilize.
- Feed the birds. Food can become difficult to find in the winter months, keep bird feeders clean and full to provide important energy sources during temperature extremes and migration periods.
- . Build a bird, bat or pollinator house. Prep for spring by building and installing safe places for wildlife to raise their young. Cleanout existing houses to make way for incoming residents!

East Rockhill is 1 of 54 municipalities located in Bucks County and is serviced by 3 post offices: Perkasie 18944, Sellersville 18960, Quakertown 18951; however East Rockhill does not include all addresses in these postal codes.

The original Rockhill Township was established in 1740. East Rockhill was organized in 1889 as an independent township and recognized and affirmed by the courts in 1890.







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
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
